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Sweet Homemade Dog Treats!!! **Crunchy Cinnamon Dog Biscuits** Ingredients: 1/2 cup vegetable oil 1/2 cup honey 1 teaspoon vanilla 1 egg

2 tablespoons milk

- 2 1/2 cups whole wheat flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon:

Directions:

1. Preheat your oven to 375 degrees and lightly grease a couple of baking sheets.

2. In a large mixing bowl, add the oil, honey, vanilla, cinnamon, milk and egg. Once you've got that mixed, stir in the flour and baking powder. Mix until a dough forms.

3. On a lightly floured surface. dump out the contents of the bowl and then knead it until all of the ingredients are incorporated and it can be spread using a rolling pin. Roll the dough out to about a 1/4 thickness and then either cut using cookie cutters or a pizza cutter.

4. Place the uncooked biscuit your baking sheets and bake minutes.

Pets Want to Meet Their **Neighbors Tool**

From "the leader of the pack" to "the top dog," plenty of simplistic metaphors come from the canine world. But relationships between canines can be pretty complex, beginning with the very first meeting.

Tips on how to introduce dogs to each other:

1. Choose a neutral location -Introduce the dogs in a neutral, unfamiliar location, so that each dog is less likely to view the other as an Intruder. Each dog

Pet owners, please ensure that your dog(s) are not barking uncontrollably. It can be a nuisance at any time of day! Make sure your pet has indoor access to plenty of food and water and never leave them alone for an unreasonable length of time. It's always a good idea to provide your animal with plenty of toys and treats to ensure they stay happy and well behaved.

Please remember to pull your animals inside at night so as to avoid those pesky midnight wildlife issues that can cause noise disturbances. Thanks for your cooperation.

should be on a leash and handled by a separate person.

2. Use positive reinforcement - Help both dogs experience "good things" when they're in each other's presence. Let them sniff each other briefly, and as they do talk to them in a happy, friendly tone of voice.

3. Be aware of body posture - One body posture that indicates things are going well is a "play-bow" where a dog will crouch with their front legs on the ground and hind end in the air. This is an invitation to play. Watch carefully for body postures that indicate an aggressive response, including hair standing up on one dog's back, deep growls, a stiff-legged gait, or a prolonged stare. If vou see such postures, interrupt the interaction immediately by calmly getting each dog interested in something else.

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possible, color code with round stickers and put up a large poster clearly identifying each color and price (ex: a red sticker would identify an item costing \$1 and a blue sticker \$2).

Be prepared for early birds to come and get first crack at your treasures. If you don't want people to preview your items, have them wait until you are ready to open.

Make certain you have enough change the day of the sale.

Decide in advance if you're going to accept checks. If you do take checks, always ask to see a CA Driver's License and write the number on the face of the check. You may also ask to see a credit card, but you may not write down the credit card number.

Have a calculator, pen and pad of paper handy to quickly total items.

Save up grocery sacks, bags and newspapers and have them handy so your customers can easily tote items back to their car.

Display things in categories. Keep clothing, linens, toys and other items separated. Try to keep clothes folded or display them on a clothes rack or coat rack if possible. Tables (card tables, folding tables, etc.) are great for displaying your items.

People love looking through bins for a bargain. You can place small like items in a bin marked with "box pricing."

Have an extension cord plugged in and ready for customers to use to make sure any electrical items are working properly.

Keep breakables away from the edges of tables and as far out of reach of children as possible.

Shop and Donate

Not sure if you knew, but the Last Chance Mercantile in Marina is the place where reusable materials get their last chance before ending up in the landfill.

Operated by the Monterey Regional Waste Management District, this facility includes public recycling drop-off bins, as well as a household and electronics hazardous waste recycling facility. They accept: Sporting goods, automotive parts and accessories, cardboard, aluminum, lumber and construction materials, clothing and linens, hardware and electrical items, furniture, TVs, housewares, gardening supplies, mulch and compost, paints, varnishes and cleaners and miscellaneous other items.

Still have leftover items after participating in the Community Garage Sale? Why not take your usable items to the Last Chance Mercantile and let them become a treasure for someone else.

Drop-offs are accepted from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday, and 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Saturday, at 14201 Del Monte Blvd. If you're looking to pick up some used household items, stop by the Mercantile Office and shopping area. Reasonably priced merchandise is available to view and purchase during the drop-off hours above.

Get Paid to Recycle all know we should recycle to environment. But now you to the right thing and get arded for it. Many companies are opping up that will pay you for your old electronic devices. These companies, such as BuyMyTronics, Gazelle, YouRenew and RecycleBank, will first try to reuse your old electronics and, if they're beyond repair, recycle them properly. Either way, they'll pay you for your device or give you the option to donate your recycling bucks to an environmental charity.

RecycleBank also partners with cities and towns to provide curbside pickup of the more traditional recyclables-paper, aluminum, plastic and glass. Residents receive credits toward partner businesses based on the amount they recycle.

While you can always resell your books, CDs, DVDs and video games on the web or at local used-goods stores, another great way to get rid of old books and media, and get new ones without spending money, is by using a swapping service. Programs such as PaperBackSwap or Swap give you a credit for every book, CD, DVD or game you mail out at your own expense, which you can then use to order one of thousands of books and media listed on their sites, sent to you free of charge.

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
